In 1936 in Camp Verde, Arizona I bought a Hallicrafters multinband radio receiver. With it I heard a local radio amateur. I contacted him and with his aid I obtained w6nkt. Next, in Placerville, California I had a 275 foot long wire end fed zepp for an antenna. I bought an RME receiver and an 80 watt (amcw) transmitter. I felt that the power was too low for me so I built a 600 watt (am-cw) transmitter.

In 1942 I started teaching at Cal Poly SLO and there later - along with Gerry Peterson - started W6 BHZ - the present Csl Poly amateur station.

In 1994 we built a new house on our 25 foot lot in Morro Bay and moved there. We had owned this property since 1946. With my 200 watt transceiver and antenna wrapped around my house I have worked the world and at my age of 101 years I am on the air every day.

The museum houses a variety of airplanes, vehicles, armament, and artifacts from WWII to the modern era. There is also a classic race car museum put together by the Woodland family.

Radio has played a major roll in our military's history and Ron Brooks and myself have been gradually assembling a working radio display using both Military and amateur radio gear. We were very fortunate to receive numerous pieces of WWII era equipment from the Bower family to start the display. I would like to thank John Dallons for his gracious donation of his VHF repeater system to the club. 146.980/146.880 machines have been a standard in Paso Robles for many years. Our area is heavy with repeaters and very light on hams. Dig out that VHF or UHF rig and operate, if only as you commute to work. Another plus is

the cell phone hands free laws don't apply! I just set up a recently licensed friend in San Luis Obispo with a VHF mobile rig and got him to finally break the ice and get on the air. I am able to keep in touch with him, through repeaters, all the way to the north of King City. He is well on his way and is studying for his General Class to gain HF privileges. Trade in that cell phone for a microphone and a good old fashioned analog QSO for short time each day!

I hope to see everyone at the annual potluck at the Lutheran Church in Templeton on February 20th, 2010. The last two have been really good and I expect this one to be great as well!

As always, if you need some help with an antenna project or station set up; don't be afraid to ask for help. The club membership includes a wide variety of expertise to draw from. Keep the bands alive, get on the air!

of the museum.


















